DETROIT, the city of contrasts, mostly associated with decay and negative performances in rankings and statistics, has become a place of inspiration for 21st century creatives and a hot spot for international urban explorers.

This film programme presents four documentaries, which shed light on different facets of Detroit: ,Requiem for Detroit' provides a dystopian perspective of how the American Dream turned into a nightmare. By contrast, the return to nature and community in ,Detroit Wild City' and the resiliance of character presented in Grown in Detroit' offer a more optimistic view. ,Detropia' is focussing on the hard work that people in Detroit undertake to survive.

A short introduction to each film will be held by students of the HafenCity University Hamburg. This film programme is part of the course "Detroit, my Muse" offered at Q-Studies/HafenCity University Hamburg in the summer semester 2014.
